We All Know What's Happening is a response to Australia's ongoing colonial relationship with Nauru. From very early phosphate mining to current negotiations around refugee detention centres, our country has repeatedly interfered with this tiny pacific island, contributing to a long list of complex and absurd injustices.

Going to school in the early 90s we were taught to celebrate Captain Cook's "settlement" of Australia, while current school children have only recently begun to learn about Australia's history of violence against First Nations people. This work hopes to extend the awareness of our country's questionable behavior further, to across the Pacific, including continuing violations of asylum seekers' basic human rights.

We All Know What's Happening premieres exactly four years from the day that the Australian government announced: "Asylum seekers who come here by boat without a visa will never be settled in Australia." This effort to keep the realities of offshore detention invisible is what our work hopes to challenge. We, like many others, want to keep this conversation on the table and see an end to the unnecessary cycle of suffering.

The instinct to shield our children from the truth of our government's policies is challenged when the victims include other children their own age. Throughout this process we have worked with seven incredible young people from across Melbourne who are thoughtful, political and deeply concerned. Some of these performers have even created their own organisation dedicated to children's rights called Children for Children.

There are no simple ways to explore this material, attempting to speak about history inevitably means deciding what to leave out. Likewise trying to create a presence for those who are absent requires complex questions regarding the politics of representation. Whilst this work plays with traditional and sometimes satirical forms such as the school musical and the history lesson, the politics of this work are intentionally palpable. What we, as makers, didn't expect was that the despair felt as we explored these ideas has been accompanied by inspiration as we witness young people dedicated to changing Australia's policies and seeing children their age find justice.

We All Know What's Happening is a work that bridges the gap between the political and the personal. Interrogating politics through devised performance, especially with young people feels hugely important. What has emerged from this project was the realisation of how our perceptions and approach to issues such as the refugee crisis are shaped and directed by the format of news reports. What strikes me amongst the debates about policy surrounding Nauru is the removal of the human element of the situation, including the voices of the people trapped on the island. However, during the many discussions throughout rehearsals what was most prevalent was this human element of the Nauru story. What this show does, while politically engaging with the topic, reminds us that this is an issue of human rights and fundamental respect of others, not just economics or policy. Through the collaborative and devising process, children of all ages have formed and strengthened a compassionate understanding of the content, which has profoundly informed the work.

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Samara Hersch is an artist working across theatre, film and contemporary performance.
