Artistic Notes

It all started with a struck match and ruminations on the vast consequences that can come from small actions. This work is not a telling of the Promethean myth, but rather an exploration of the physicality of heat: how does it move, what does it sound like, what are its implications?

A Small Prometheus is also about unpredictability and the boiling points that tip one state into another – from cooperative to menacing, chaotic to ordered, individualistic to unified. The work teeters between recklessness and structure. From convectiondriven sound sculptures through intricate and forceful choreography to the sound of heat dissipating in different situations, this work examines the moment when a stable system becomes unstable. Flame, steam, smoke and burning drive the action, with a shifting tension between mechanical precision and anarchic wildness.

A Small Prometheus looks at the coexisting darkness and light in human nature and the spark that mediates the two.

Biographies

Stephanie Lake Choreographer

Stephanie Lake is an award-winning choreographer and dancer. After graduating from the VCA she began dancing with companies including Gideon Obarzanek's Chunky Move, Lucy Guerin Inc and BalletLab, and has performed and toured worldwide for the past 13 years. As a choreographer, she has been commissioned by Sydney Dance Company (Dream Lucid, 2012) Chunky Move (Mix Tape - Green Room Award, Best Choreography, 2011), Frontier Danceland, Singapore (AxiaL, 2013), Stompin, VCA and Melbourne Festival: and has collaborated with David Rosetzky, Missy Higgins and Natasha Pincus. Her most recent work DUAL (Dance Massive 2013) was nominated for a Helpmann Award for Outstanding Choreography. Future works include Aorta for Chunky Move and Elektra for Sydney Dance Company/Sydney Symphony. Stephanie was listed with Robin Fox in *The Age*'s Top 100 in 2012. She was inaugural winner of the Peggy Van Praagh Choreographic Fellowship (2012) and is currently honorary Resident Director at Lucy Guerin Inc.

Robin Fox

Composer and Sculpture Designer

Robin Fox is an artist working across multiple forms. His Laser Show has been performed in over 50 cities at festivals worldwide: he has exhibited visual artwork at CCP Melbourne. GOMA Brisbane and the Australian Synchrotron, among others. His composition Three Studies for Bionic Ear was selected by the Paris Rostrum of Composers in 2012. His work on Chunky Move's Mortal Engine contributed to a Helpmann Award for best visual production and an honourable mention at the illustrious Prix Ars Electronica. He has released sound on Mego (Vienna), Bocian (Poland), Kranky (USA), Room 40 (Australia) and Synaesthesia (Australia). Recent works include The Giant Theremin for the City of Melbourne and the White Beam project at Dark MOFO.

Alana Everett

Performer

Alana Everett graduated from the VCA in 2011. She has choreographed for corporate events and solo singers from the Talented Development Program. At the VCA she worked with choreographic mentors Phillip Adams, Rebecca Hilton, Brett Daffy, Lina Limosani, Stephanie Lake and Anna Smith. She was featured in Neil Adams's *En Masse* (2009) and Brett Daffy's *Kwacko* (2010). In 2011 she began working with Stephanie Lake. **A Small Prometheus** is her professional debut.

Lauren Langlois

Performer

Lauren Langlois trained in classical ballet with Marie Walton-Mahon Dance Academy and in contemporary dance at the New Zealand School of Dance. She has performed in works by Sydney Dance Company, Australian Dance Theatre, Larissa McGowan, Lina Limosani, Lisa Wilson and Jacapo Godani. For Chunky Move she has performed in 247 Days, An Act of Now and Keep Everything, the latter earning her Helpmann and Green Room Award nominations for Best Female Dancer.

Rennie McDougall

Performer

Rennie McDougall is a performer, choreographer, teacher and writer. Since graduating from the VCA in 2010 he has worked with Phillip Adams BalletLab, Chunky Move, Lucy Guerin Inc, Luke George, Stephanie Lake and Lee Serle; touring nationally and internationally. He created the short works *Just Watch Me* for Next Wave (2010); and *Thoughts are Circular* for Lucy Guerin Inc (2011). He premiered his first full-length work, *SUPERTONE*, as part of Next Wave 2012, and recently premiered *yes dance* for Melbourne Fringe 2013.

Lily Paskas

Performer

Lily Paskas graduated from the VCA in 2006. With Amber Haines she created and performed in *Away* for Lucy Guerin's Pieces for

Small Spaces (2007) and *Slug Love Goonion* for Next Wave (2008). She choreographed *Wade Rising* for With the Lot curated by Kyle Kremerskothen and Lucy Guerin (2009) and *The happy Pony club come in* for Nat Cursio's Private Dances (2010). She has performed for Chunky Move, X machine, Rogue, Phantom Limbs, Finucane & Smith, Black Lung Theatre Company, Antony Hamilton, Shelley Lasica, Lee Serle, Jo Lloyd, Stephanie Lake, Frances D'Ath, Daniel Schlusser, Rennie McDougall, Melanie Lane and Felix Ruckert. She was nominated for Green Room and Australian Dance Awards for her performance in Antony Hamilton's Drift.

Lee Serle

Performer

Lee Serle has collaborated and performed with Lucy Guerin Inc, Chunky Move, Antony Hamilton, Shelley Lasica, Stephanie Lake and Byron Perry. In 2010 he was awarded a mentorship with American choreographer Trisha Brown as part of the Rolex Mentor and Protégé Arts Initiative; performing, touring and developing a new work with her company in New York. In 2012 he was an inaugural recipient of an Australia Council Creative Australia Fellowship, developing his choreographic practice in Melbourne, New York and Beirut. His choreographic credits include A Little Murky for Lucy Guerin's Pieces for Small Spaces; I Feel Love and On It Goes for Next Wave; and P.O.V. at both the New York Public Library and Dance Massive 2013. This year he has been commissioned to create a new work on Lyon Opera Ballet, alongside Lucy Guerin and William Forsythe.

Jen Hector

Lighting Designer

Jen Hector has received five Green Room Award nominations for lighting and set design. Recent projects include Sandra Parker's *The Recording*, Jo Lloyd's *Future Perfect*, Rimini Protokoll's *100% Melbourne*, Back to Back Theatre's *Hell House* and Madeleine Flynn and Tim Humphrey's *Gauge*. She has also worked with Circus Oz, Tim Darbyshire, YGLAM, Jenny Kemp, BalletLab, Richard Murphett and Leisa Shelton.

Harriet Oxley

Costume Designer

Harriet Oxley studied fashion at RMIT and theatre design at the VCA, and has gained over ten years' experience designing costumes for theatre, dance, opera, film, circus and musical theatre. Recent credits include *Moonshadow the Musical, Unashamed Desire* (music video for Missy Higgins) and Ros Warby's *Tower Suites* (2012); Chunky Move/Victorian Opera's *Assembly* (2011, 2012); Chunky Move's *Mix Tape* by Stephanie Lake and Victorian Opera's *Angelique/The Bear* (winner of a Green Room Award for design in opera)(2010); Tamara Saulwick/Malthouse's *Pindrop* (2010, 2011); and Jenny Kemp's *Madeleine* (2010).

Richard Dinnen worked in Queensland, Sydney and the UK before relocating to Melbourne, where he has worked for a decade with companies including Arena Theatre, the Malthouse, Andrew Kay and Associates, and the Sydney and Melbourne Festivals. Lee Serle, MONA FOMA and Dark MOFO, Byron Perry and Force Majeure. Megafun provides creative and technical services to theatre, events, exhibitions, public art and interactive media.
