Partnerships are an important component of Arts House. By creating program opportunities with a range of organisations and the independent arts sector, Arts House ensures our thriving creative industry goes from strength to strength.

In 2016, Arts House will present a larger scale *Festival of Live Art* program (1 to 13 March) in partnership with Footscray Community Arts Centre and Theatre Works, with more than 20 events taking place over 12 days at North Melbourne Town Hall and across the city. Working with the University of Melbourne, Arts House will also play a critical role at the Performance Studies International (PSi) conference, by curating and presenting the public program for this major international conference.

In addition, Season 1 comprises three performance works, including a large-scale participative work by UK artist Nic Green, a new work by the recently appointed Creative Director of the Melbourne Indigenous Arts Festival Jacob Boehme and a solo work by Berlin-based Australian artist Melanie Jame Walsh, as well as several co-presentations in the 2016 Next Wave Festival.

This new collection of works is testament to Arts House's reputation as one of Australia's most exciting contemporary arts presenters.

Filled with energy and creativity, and always pushing the boundaries, Season 1 2016 will be one to remember.

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

Life is strange. One minute we can share moments of pleasurable intimacy over coffee with a friend, before despairing at the latest headline charting our species' incapacity to live sustainably and with justice.

This season's Arts House program bursts with work by extraordinary artists who find meaning in these complex contradictions – inviting us to connect, witness and participate.

The Festival of Live Art celebrates diversity – of forms, gender, sexuality and ability. It's an unflinching critique of our contemporary world: of the economy we make art in; of the misogyny spilling casually into social media; and the relationships we pursue with our digital devices sometimes at the expense of each other and the natural world.

Then we pass the baton to an all-new-generation of Next Wave artists, flooding every corner of Arts House with their investigations into what's wrong and what's not. In June we present three works focusing on the body in performance, exploring our relationships with the body as women, as HIV+, as Indigenous and as bodies at work.

In a new partnership with the University of Melbourne, we present *Performing Climates*, a public program of the Performing Studies International conference; including Marrugeku Theatre's large-scale work, *Cut the Sky*, telling stories of the devastating impact on Western Australia's environment and Indigenous communities. *Performing Climates* also includes a part-game/part-performance investigating the interplay of natural and human-made systems; an environmental installation and lament for Australia's landscape; and a tender invitation to touch the rising oceans of the Pacific. Not least, *Performing Climates* features *Refuge* – an artistled rehearsal of Arts House's role in the event of a climate catastrophe.

North Melbourne Town Hall is where everything happens. Its history of small and large civic exchanges – of paying traffic fines and getting dog licenses, of social gatherings and political debates – is reframed amid new transactions, with moments of joy exploding alongside elegies, diatribes and dancing. The sometimes-polarising tensions of locally created arts that ambitiously contribute to a national civic and cultural discussion, with artists who work and think globally, create the force field that both energises the Arts House program and keeps it accountable.

Hosted by Arts House, Theatre Works and Footscray Community Arts Centre, the *Festival of Live Art* captivates inner Melbourne for 13 days in March, springing you out of your comfort zone with over 50 surprising, participatory and interactive art experiences.

North Melbourne Town Hall becomes a palace of the real and the unreal for the Festival, and to make sure you take in as much as you can, we introduce the epic Town Hall Ticket so that you can spend a day or night diving into the unexpected. But live art does have a habit of busting boundaries. You might be in a theatre, a foyer, a private booth...or a hotel, or maybe a carwash. You could be watching, strolling, sharing a meal, becoming hysterical or drinking tea. You might be onstage – though there might not be a stage. Grab a Town Hall Ticket or head to shows at the Meat Market, West Space in the CBD, or one of our more eclectic venues – and be sure to join us for a fabulous free party on 12 March.

Designed for curious audiences of one or two or hundreds, the *Festival of Live Art* takes the lids off all the boxes, offering journeys both microscopic and epic, from the seats to the streets. Festival of Live Art

Town Hall Ticket One Ticket to a Town Hall Full of Live Art

For the duration of the festival, Arts House fills every nook and cranny of North Melbourne Town Hall with live art works, and you can experience just about everything with just one ticket.



The Town Hall Ticket lets you curate your own adventure through over 15 artworks, across seven *Festival of Live Art* sessions. Each six-hour session includes both seated performances and boutique moments. With plenty of opportunities to take risks and go exploring, the Town Hall Ticket gives you time to come and go as you please, and see as much as you like.

How it works

The Town Hall Ticket is a single ticket to ALL *Festival of Live Art* performances, shows and exhibitions at North Melbourne Town Hall on the day or night of your session. You cannot purchase individual tickets to North Melbourne Town Hall shows.

Doors open for six hours at 2pm on Saturday 5 March, and 5pm on all other dates. Think of it like a music festival: one ticket to see whatever you like on that day/night. To keep your energy levels up, there'll be food and drinks available for purchase at North Melbourne Town Hall and nearby.

Town Hall Ticket sessions are:

- \rightarrow from 2pm, Sat 5 March
- \rightarrow from 5pm, Wed 9, Thu 10, Fri 11 March

What you can see

From 2 to 5 March, featured shows include Luke George's *Erotic Dance* (7pm) and Hissy Fit's *I Might Blow Up Someday* (10pm). From 9 to 11 March, the feature work is Claire Cunningham's *Give Me a Reason to Live*, (7pm). Your Town Hall Ticket guarantees you entry to feature shows on your session day.

Your Town Hall Ticket also lets you experience a range of other works on your session day, on a first-come-first-in basis. These include the *In Your Hands* works for hand-held devices, a pop-up tearoom, onstage dating and podium dancing, some intimate and not-so-intimate performances, participatory installations and more. Schedules for these works may be subject to change.

Erotic Dance Luke George & Collaborators

Concept, Choreography & Performance: Luke George Original Sound Creation & Performance: Nick Roux Producer: Alison Halit Dramaturgy: Nicola Gunn Lighting design: Bosco Shaw Costume Design: Justin Kelly & Luke George Breathing, shuddering, shaking and pulsing, *Erotic Dance* is a sensual duet between dancer, Luke George and sound artist, Nick Roux. Exploring the intimacy between performer and spectator, it suggests an experience of art that is primitive and seductive, arousing and visceral – one that appeals to magic and higher connection.

In 1961, Susan Sontag wrote, "we need an erotics of art". George flirts with Sontag's phrase, taking it to the letter to discover what 'an erotic dance' might be for audiences today. Clothed or naked, balletic, vibrating or still, George uses his dancing body to undress performance itself – intensely describing how space, knowledge and belief mingle to move us beyond what we see.

I Might Blow Up Someday Hissy Fit

Hissy Fit: Jade Muratore, Emily O'Connor & Nat Randall Sound Artist: Nina Buchanan Lighting Design: Toby Knyvett Choreographer: Lizzie Thompson Dramaturgs: Emma Price & Chris Ryan Hair Stylist: Sophie Roberts Make-Up Artist: Anastasia Zaravinos A collective episode of mass hysteria, *i might blow up someday* slides between choreography, sound and live video with headbanging intensity.

Defiant, subversive and contagious, Hissy Fit's surging multimedia spectacle remembers both the 19th-century's institutionalised female 'hysteric' and nods – violently – towards the rock icons of 80s and 90s punk and metal.

Hissy Fit's work tears at the edges of both deviancy and control,

played out through the gendered body. Placing their own bodies under pressure, collaborators Jade Muratore, Emily O'Connor and Nat Randall test physical, mental and emotional limits, erupting from internally imposed constraint to furiously channel creative energy.

Risky, confronting and unpredictable, *i might blow up someday* rivetingly incites participation and release and perhaps a few hissy fits of our own.

Give Me a Reason to Live Claire Cunningham

Choreography & Performance: Claire Cunningham Lighting Design: Karsten Tinapp Sound Design: Zoë Irvine Cello: Matthias Herrmann Costume: Shanti Freed In a starkly beautiful dance of transcendence and struggle, renowned UK performer Claire Cunningham delves into the work of medieval Dutch painter Hieronymous Bosch, to explore religion, religious art, and the judgment of souls and bodies.

Through tests of both body and faith, *Give Me a Reason to Live* draws upon imagery of disabled people in Bosch's apocalyptic paintings to question our present perspectives on "otherness" and "difference". It is also a potent memorial to the disabled victims of both the Nazis' euthanasia program and the UK government's current 'welfare reform'.

Cunningham's work is often rooted in the use/misuse of her crutches, seizing space and physicality to create an aesthetic entirely her own. Powerfully physical, visually striking, and set to a mesmerising score, *Give Me a Reason to Live* invites us to consider our own empathy, sympathy or indifference, in a work of both generosity and brutal immediacy.

Programmed to Reproduce Casey Jenkins

Performer: Casey Jenkins Sound: Manuel Zabel Programmed to Reproduce provocatively unpacks and unpicks societal pressures and expectations. In this world premiere durational performance, artist Casey Jenkins recreates, extends and digests responses to her 2013 work, Casting off My Womb.

In *Casting off My Womb*, Jenkins knitted using wool loomed from her vagina, over an entire menstrual cycle. A video of the work went viral, eliciting thousands of derisive comments from around the world. *Programmed to Reproduce* is her response.

Creating a new crocheted and knitted installation, Jenkins reflects on personal identity in the digital age and public reactions to her earlier work. Audiences are invited to share their own online experiences of judgment by strangers, joining a unique commentary on archaic gender assumptions and age-old bullying techniques. Weaving words and wool, and through Jenkins's own body, obsolete knitting machines and electronic hacking, Programmed to Reproduce unravels the complex web between our public and private selves.

Enter a dreamlike installation space, where traditional, surreal and virtual tearooms pop up unannounced. Through a series of tea ceremonies, Yumi Umiumare and her collaborating artists invite you to ingest their unique teas of sereniTea, deformiTea, sensualiTea and more.

Traditionally, tea-ceremony rooms had a small door which visitors bowed to enter, dropping the hierarchies of the world outside. In times of war, Medieval Samurai had to leave their swords outside as the tearoom provided relief from the emotional stress and social disorder of the battlefield.

Curious about what sort of 'tea' we can make today, Umiumare invokes the Japanese notion of 'ma' or 'active pause'. Beginning with deep presence and silence, experience a pause for reflection – as well as provocation.

Sex and Death invites you to reflect on life, death and what happens in between. Part-date, part-photoshoot, it's a chance to ask the big questions to someone a little older and wiser, and to consider the experience of yourself changing through time. Bring a photo of yourself – just you, from at least ten years ago – the further back the better. A time that was significant then, or feels significant now. But most importantly, a time you can talk about. Through playful and provocative encounters, explore how time shapes, morphs and ultimately makes us who we were, who we are, and who we will become. Artists: Bruce Mowson & Elliot Howard Pass through, lie down or lose your head with *The Gold Works*, a series of social, sculptural and spatial assemblages whose value depends on what you do with them. They include an imaginary guillotine, an actual archway and a horizontal non-cinema.

Bruce thinks using them is the best way to use them. Elliot thinks not using them might be just as good, and certainly shouldn't be inferior. While you might ask, "What do *The Gold Works* want me to do?", *The Gold Works* want to ask, "What do *you* want to do?" Play, admire, be invited or be provoked – value might be found within the glitter.



As the looming carwash robot goes about its work, tune in to a synchronised soundtrack from inside your vehicle, matched to the robot's graceful movements. 'Immersive' in more ways than one, *Crush* takes place amid the hiss of water jets and whirr of brushes – an automated ceremony for gears and ears, curiously evoking the drive-in cinema. Cocooning the audience in that most familiar of spaces – the car interior – *Crush* imbues a banal task with ceremony and takes a sonically powerful look at the future of our relationships with machines.

Do those who object to contemporary art prefer community parades? *Howl* is a celebration of 15 significant moments in art history. A of Captain Cook, thousands of sunflower seeds and a killer whale named Tilikum. A requiem that is unquestionably queer, arguably dangerous and probably obscene. Performed by three women. Scored by Mozart himself.

> Created by Willoh S. Weiland, Lara Thoms and Lz Dunn, Howl commemorates controversy -

from a furore over a feminist self-portrait and outrage at a rainbow repeatedly burnt in a public square to artists arrested on ritual procession starring a sculpture suspicion of bio-terrorism. Howl energetically probes the reactions art can invoke and tests the perspectives that history permits.

Capra launches his breathtaking scent, 'Eau de Wet Dogge' – a fragrance inspired by his pet dachshund Teena – in conjunction with a free dog wash, available to members of the general public.

Interested in how to prompt healing experiences for both individuals and communities, Capra creates fanciful and accessible works that invite physical and sensory engagement. Part performance, part installation and part pooch parlour, *Teena's Bathtime: Eau de Wet Dogge* turns West Space into 'Wet Space' – in a colourful, playful experience that will have you plunged to your elbows in bubbles and breathing in blissfully deep.


Next Wave at Arts House

We hold memories in our blood. It connects us. It defines us. *Blood on the Dance Floor* explores the legacies and memories of our bloodlines, our need for community, and what blood means to each of us – questioning how this most precious fluid unites and divides us.

A choreographer, dancer and writer from the Narangga and Kaurna nations of South Australia, Jacob Boehme was diagnosed with HIV in 1998. In search of answers, he reached out to his ancestors. Through a powerful blend of theatre, image, text and choreography, Boehme pays homage to their ceremonies whilst dissecting the politics of gay, Blak and poz identities.

Blood on the Dance Floor is an unapologetic, passionate and visceral narrative that traverses time, space and characters. A story of our need to love and be loved, Boehme's striking monologue reveals our secret identities and our deepest fears, seeking to invoke ancestral lineage in a contemporary quest for courage and hope. 2 – 12 June

Mira Fuchs Melanie Jame Wolf/ Savage Amusement

She's also the public face of artist Melanie Jame Wolf's eight-year private life as a stripper in a gentleman's club. Mira wants to dance you through the myriad questions and contradictions of her work, that time and her world.

In an intimate, in-the-round work, Wolf speaks, prances and twists her way through an abstracted memoir that trips between lap-dance and body politics. With humour, high heels and deep insight, she fashions a looking glass for our own reflections on the work of stripping.

Leave your preconceptions with the coat-check and step into an oft-hidden economy of desire and exchange. Both entertaining and unflinchingly personal, *MIRA FUCHS* explores sexuality, gender, performance, intimacy, dance-as-labour, looking and being looked at, and pleasure, in a world where money is time and timing is everything.

Trilogy Nic Green

Concept & Direction: Nic Green Producer: Feral In this adventurous and celebratory performance event, Glasgowbased artist Nic Green exuberantly examines feminism, inviting women of all ages and backgrounds to share the stage in an energetic tribute. Presented across the UK to wide acclaim, *Trilogy* now greets Melbourne with its bold and joyous proclamation.

Trilogy begins by celebrating women in today's world – with all their complexities, in their skins and as they are. Footage from the landmark 1971 discussion Town Bloody Hall – in which Norman Mailer took on passionate feminists including Germaine Greer – kicks off the responses and reflections of five young performers; before an exuberant paean for womankind concludes an evening of eclectic style and rousing energy.

Honest and adventurous, *Trilogy* deftly weaves performance, participation, discussion, music and archival material; carving out new space for feminism and rallying the power and strength in women together.



6 – 10 July

Performing Climates

Arts House partners with the University of Melbourne to host *Performing Climates* – an arts program designed and curated for the public by Arts House for the 2016 Performance Studies International (PSi) conference.

COP15 marked a tipping point: at the very least, a global acknowledgment of the impacts of climate change; and perhaps the beginning of real plans to limit future damage. In this context, artists, activists, scientists and citizens are collaborating to radically re-imagine, reconfigure and research how and where art intersects with climate change; and our capacity to respond to, prepare for and mitigate it.

Performing Climates explores these themes with five major projects, along with a series of discussions, dinners and dancing – because even as we face global climate catastrophe, we can and must experience joy, connectedness and sustenance. 6 - 10 July

In a burnt landscape a group of climate change refugees faces yet another extreme weather event. Propelled back and forward in time, they revisit conflict with mining companies, the destruction of fauna and the relegation of the marginalised, while contemplating the gift of life and the life-giving force of the sun. Butterflies swarm searching for water; dancers disintegrate into the light. A song is sung, calling for rain.

Like climate change itself, *Cut the Sky* is both local and international – bringing together artists from Europe, Asia, Africa and remote and urban Australia. An ambitious and poignant meditation on humanity's frailty in the face of our own actions, *Cut the Sky* showcases Marrugeku's unique contemporary vision – restless, taut and unwavering.

Refuge

How should cultural spaces respond to catastrophic emergencies? How can we ensure that we and our communities are prepared, and that we understand and fulfil our role as a local resource? What role should the arts, and artists, play in planning for such events?

Central to the *Performing Climates* program is *Refuge*: a research–action event in which artists and disaster management professionals work with the North Melbourne community to devise responses to a climactic disaster. It configures North Melbourne Town Hall, home of Arts House, as a place of community refuge.

At a time when communities around the world are affected by unprecedented natural and human-induced disasters, and as we stare the long emergency of climate change in the face, a conversation around preparedness, resilience and recovery could not be more pertinent. From wildfires to hurricanes to rising sea levels, the future looks increasingly uncertain.

Involving artists in the months leading up to *Performing Climates*, as well as a range of disaster management services and organisations across the city, *Refuge* is both a rehearsal in preparedness and a shoring-up of our allimportant connections.

Enfold Ria Soemardjo & Jade Dewi Tyas Tunggal

The rising waters of the Pacific and increased displacement of Pacific Islanders provide the impetus for *Enfold* – a poetic contemplation of water and our relationship to it. An installation and ritual performance from the deeply experienced and richly talented team of Jade Dewi Tyas Tunggal, Ria Soemardjo and Paula van Beek, *Enfold* explores themes of tidal shorelines, relocation and shelter. It invokes an ancient way of seeing, in which deep interconnections are revealed between the microcosmic realms of the human body and the macrocosmic, mystical universe.

And the Earth Sighed Josephine Starrs & Leon Cmielewski

In an immersive audiovisual installation that re-imagines the relationship between nature and culture, Starrs & Cmielewski configure the land itself as active, not neutral, and able to speak about our human impacts upon it. Using imagery captured by drones, detailed aerial views of Australian landscapes and waterways are dynamically manipulated in ways that reveal their underlying fragility; while Alex Davies' surround soundscape invites contemplation of the impact of climate change on natural ecologies.

Best Festival Ever: How to Manage a Disaster Boho

We are surrounded by and embedded in systems, both natural and human-made – from climate and the ecosystem to the economy or even society itself. Many of today's significant issues emerge from the interplay between such systems. Taking systems science as its basis, *Best Festival Ever* is both interactive and performative – part theatre show, part performance lecture and part board game. Its audience gathers around a table, working together to deliver a unique music festival, from planning to execution, and doing their best to prevent the system from collapsing into chaos.

We've commissioned our amazing resident food-maker, Cassie from Firecracker, to create a body entirely from food. You're invited to join us, along with artists from our June shows, to ingest, digest, savour, transform and excrete it. Along the way we'll be exploring the corporate, the corporeal and relationships between the two, from the contemporary to the historical.

The Politics of Ageing 7pm, Mon 7 March

We are all ageing – every minute, of every day. Internally we may feel exactly the same, but how do others start to see us differently? Break bread with *Sex and Death* performers Lorna Hannan, John Flaus, Liz Jones, Delia Bradshaw and Natalie de Maccus, in a conversation about getting older and living more wildly and boldly in whatever body we inhabit.

There's a thrill in being lost. When everything feels scattered, a picture starts to emerge. And then the folk music starts again. Share a meal with Xan Colman and Austrian artists Laia Fabre and Thomas Kasebacher, of notfoundyet and A is for Atlas.

<u>CultureLAB</u>

Research and development is crucial to the life cycle of a strong contemporary arts culture. In 2016, Arts House Artists in Residence Jacob Boehme, Mariaa Randall and Isaac Drandic continue their 2015 development at ArtPlay. In April Canadian artist, Jen Rae (The Centre for Cultural Partnerships, VCA, and The Riparian Project) and American artist, Dawn Weleski (Conflict Kitchen), will collaborate for the first time in Melbourne on their project, *Sustenance: Conversations on Food Conflict and Security*, in the lead-up to *Performing Climates*. 
