Biographies

Natalie Abbott Choreographer/Performer

Natalie Abbott graduated in dance from the VCA in 2007, as recipient of the Orloff Family Trust Scholarship for most outstanding talent; and has since channelled her energies into creating thought-provoking dance. Her works include Pastel Playground (2007), Parade (2008), Paradise Pop-Up (2009), Ultimate Pressure - a video and sensory immersion work (Next Wave 2010), Circles for Squares for Lucy Guerin's Pieces for Small Spaces (2011) and Physical Fractals (Next Wave 2012). In 2012 Natalie also presented her video work Levity at Blindside Gallery, and commenced development of a new work, MID-air, at PACT in Sydney. In 2011 she received an Ian Potter Cultural Trust Grant and was also a Next Wave Kickstart artist.

In 2013 Natalie Abbott presents **Physical Fractals** at Dance Massive; will undertake further creative development for *MID-air* as an Arts House CultureLab artist, and will assist the *soft landing* professional development program at QL2 Centre for Youth Dance, Canberra. She is an avid performer, choreographer and experimental media artist, constantly seeking to extend her craft through practice and experience.

Rebe<mark>cca Jensen</mark> Collaborator

Rebecca Jensen is a Melbourne-based dancer, performer, choreographer and budding costume designer. Originally from West Auckland, New Zealand, she studied at the VCA, graduating in 2009. In 2011 she performed in Jo Lloyd's Future Perfect and Sandra Parker's Document, and with BalletLab as an intern in Above at MONA FOMA, Hobart. She has made work for Lucy Guerin (Within an inner, for Pieces for Small Spaces, 2011), Melbourne Jazz Festival, MONA FOMA Festival Club, and Emerge at Dancehouse; and has also choreographed numerous primary school musicals in New Zealand. She has received both an Australia Council ArtStart grant and an Ian Potter Cultural Trust travel grant. In 2013 she is creating new work through Next Wave's Kickstart program.

Sarah Aiken Performer

Performer, choreographer and teacher Sarah Aiken has worked with choreographers including Shian Law, Carlee Mellow, James Welsby, Brooke Stamp/Aphids and Ben Speth. An Australia Council ArtStart recipient, she has recently undertaken research and development in Europe; and performed two short works,

No Longer than Arms and Now Something Really Final at K77 Berlin, funded by the lan Potter Cultural Trust. Her choreographic work includes Jurassic Arc (Dancehouse), Your Way (Melbourne Fringe) and DanceMusic (Dancehouse Emerge), as well as a range of collaborative and interdisciplinary projects. A 2013 Kickstart artist, she is collaborating with dancemaker Rebecca Jensen to create a new work for Next Wave 2014.

Daniel Arnott Live Sound

Daniel Arnott graduated from the VCA in music performance (improvisation) in 2010. There, he developed an interest in extended techniques on guitar, group improvisation and Billie Holiday. He has been working with dance artists since graduation, as he finds many similarities between dance and music - notably rhythm. At the VCA he performed in Ensemble MAX, a free group-improvising collective, where he experimented with loops and other live effects on both his guitar and other percussive instruments. This experimentation has been pivotal for composing music and sound for dance and film. He developed the dance film Garage in 2009; and Dancemusic, a piece with dancer Sarah Aiken, in 2010. His musical endeavours encompass folk music, free improvisation and jazz.

Matthew Day Dramaturge

Matthew Day is a dancer, choreographer and dramaturge working across various artistic media and cultural contexts. He is invested in conceptual choreographic practices that are intensely physical and push the boundaries of choreography and performance. He studied dance and performance at the University of Western Sydney (2003-04) and the VCA (2005) before collaborating with students at the SNDO, Netherlands (2006-09). He has undertaken residencies at Critical Path, Lucy Guerin Inc, Chunky Move, Legs on the Wall, and the Bundanon Trust, where he worked with Deborah Hay on her Solo Commissioning Project. He premiered Intermission, the final instalment in his solo series Trilogy, at PACT centre for emerging artists in 2012; the previous works in this series, Thousands and Cannibal, have been met with critical acclaim. He will also work with Phillip Adams BalletLab on numerous projects in the coming years.

Govin Ruben Lighting Designer

Govin Ruben is co-founder of the Rubix Cube: a company designed to foster collaboration and increase the professional development of artists in Australia. Based in Melbourne, Rubix Cube has access to a pool of artists who have worked all over Australia and internationally on projects ranging from large-scale governmentsponsored events to experimental fringe theatre. The company's aim is to provide a platform where key artists can come together, collaborate and share their mutual passion to write, create, design, direct and perform works of art in Australia and around the world.
