A NOTE FROM POLYTOXIC

Welcome to Polytoxic's first full-length production, Teuila Postcards.

Inspired in part by cheesy tourism commercials selling the unspoiled magical beaches and 'the beautiful tribal peoples' of the Pacific, this work is also influenced by our personal experiences and the different ways Pacific culture has been perceived within our own lives. The Teuila flower is the national flower of Samoa, so this work could be seen as our holiday postcard from Samoa to you, albeit a slightly warped one!

The work is loosely framed by the journey of three tourists to a fantasy island expecting an exotic, blissful holiday. It draws on a range of sources, including historical missionary diary entries from the 1830s, tacky tourism adverts, Elvis-style Hawaiian movies, and a view of everyday Samoa. Fusing traditional Pacific and contemporary dance theatre, Teuila Postcards is a tongue-in-cheek look at the oppression and evolution of an island.

ABOUT POLYTOXIC

The energising high pace vitality of Polytoxic's signature style is like no other. Inspired by the traditions of the Pacific and the kitsch of pop-culture, Polytoxic serves up dance performances that feature cheeky parody, intricate costuming, and choreographic attention to detail.

Creative and accessible, the company works in a diverse range of contexts including community cultural development, dance workshops, roving, theatrical cabaret, comedy, dance-theatre, mainstream outdoor events and in live music collaborations.

Polytoxic has recently been selected for the prestigious Management and Production Services (MAPS) initiative, and in 2009 is touring **Teuila Postcards** nationally to venues including Sydney Opera House, Arts House (Melbourne), Ten Days on the Island Festival (Tasmania), and Come Out Festival (Adelaide). Other highlights for the company include two sell-out seasons of **Teuila Postcards** at the Brisbane Powerhouse; Dance-Tracks Pasifika Seams at The Sydney Opera House; three regional Queensland tours of children's work Green Bananas, which also toured to Federation Square (Melbourne); and numerous commissions and events including FINA swimming championships, Cirque du Soleil opening events, Out of the Box Children's Festival, Brisbane Pasifika and Adelaide Fringe Festival.

BIOGRAPHIES

Efeso Fa'anana - Co-creator, Performer

Coming from a Samoan-Australian upbringing, Efeso Fa'anana (Fez) grew up with heavy involvement in traditional performance and hip hop dance groups. Fez has developed his art form as a performer, choreographer, performance maker and an ambassador for the Pasifik Arts within dance, theatre and more recently circus since 2000. Fez's work has featured in Adelaide Fringe Festival, Sydney Festival, Melbourne Comedy Festival and Brisbane Cabaret Festival to name a few. His work bends through visual theatre, cabaret, contemporary circus and installation performance. He has worked with Strut 'n' Fret production house, Brisbane Powerhouse, Performance Space and forges independent, diverse, confronting and comical performance work.

Lisa Fa'alafi – Co-creator, Performer

When Lisa Fa'alafi graduated from Queensland University of Technology in 1997 with a Bachelor of Arts (Drama), she knew that she was not fit for a conventional theatre or dance company. She looked on TV and couldn't find a Polynesian family on Neighbours and wondered how on earth she would ever fit her big islander feet into a pair of ballet shoes so she could be a 'real dancer.' In 2000 Lisa along with lifelong friend Efeso Fa'anana formed Polytoxic Dance Company. Furthering her skills and interest in costume design Lisa has spent time developing her traditional Samoan arts and crafts skills through yearly trips to Samoa and gone on to work with female Pacifican artist Chantal Fraser, to collaborate on her first short solo work, White Coconut. Both Lisa and Leah have received wide acclaim for their costume design for company shows and have been commissioned as designers for Strut 'n' Fret Production House, CIRCA and many corporate clients.

Leah Shelton - Co-creator, Performer

Leah Shelton is an actor, dancer, performance-maker, choreographer and costume designer who works as a solo artist and as an artistic collaborator. Originally dance-trained, she has a diverse performance background, including a decade working with the Actor Training Method of Tadashi Suzuki with Frank Theatre (ozfrank.com), with whom she has performed nationally and internationally. She is currently a core member of two performance ensembles, The Brides of Frank (thebridesoffrank.com) and Polytoxic (polytoxiclovesyou.com). As a solo artist Leah creates physical performance work that is highly visual, theatrical and absurdist. Leah has also worked in an arts management capacity for a range of organisations including Ausdance Qld, Brisbane Festival, QPAC and Youth Arts Queensland.

Justin Marshman - Stage Manager

Since graduating from Queensland University of Technology with a Bachelor of Fine Arts (Technical Production), Justin has worked as Stage Manager for CIRCA, La Boite Theatre Company, Flipside Circus, The Brides of Frank, Millennium Entertainment International, Backbone Youth Arts, Imaginary Ltd, Brisbane Festival, Queensland Music Festival, State Library of Queensland, Kooemba Jdarra, Queensland Performing Arts Centre, Brisbane Powerhouse and others. Justin realised the design for David Fenton's Unstable Acts and The Goat Project (CIRAC). In 2008, Justin became the Executive Producer for the Restaged Histories project, a Brisbane based contemporary performance company.
