Arts House values arts and culture that help create a world where people are actively engaged, aware and empowered to participate, politically and culturally, to make positive change.



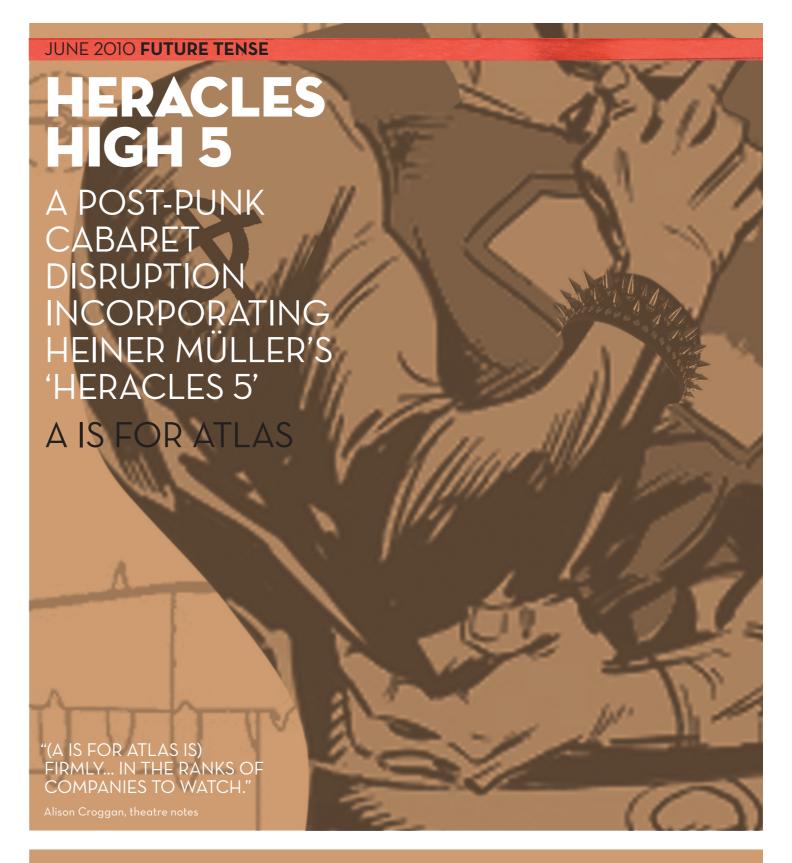

DIRECTORS NOTE

Everyone loves a good hero. Someone to look up to, someone to cheer for. But how do we separate the myth from the reality?

Known knowns:

For those who come across the sea we've boundless plains to share.

Known unknowns:

Heracles (Roman: Hercules) was conceived by the mortal woman Alcmene. Sired not by her husband Amphytrion, but rather by the mischievous chief god of Olympus, Zeus, who snuck down to Earth and into her bed. Zeus had the boy named "glory to Hera" to appease the jealousy of his own - godly - wife. Yet Hera still raged enough to strike her stepchild with a madness that made him kill his (first) wife and children. Hera also forced him to serve the idiot king of Thebes Eurystheus for ten years, in which the Twelve Labours of Heracles were carried out (the fifth of these Labours required Heracles to wash clean the enormous stinking stables of Augias, king of Elis and supplier of meat to all of Greece). After his Labours, the man was made a god and given his stepsister Hebe as a prize.

Unknown unknowns: Given his strength, wit and charms, and despite his flaws, Heracles is simply the greatest hero of all times...

BIOGRAPHIES

Xan Colman is the Artistic Director of A is for Atlas. Recent directing credits include: Ouartet with the Razor (2009), Duets for Actor and Musician (2008), When We Fall (2006) and I Start Again (2006) for A is for Atlas, Kala Khun Nueng (Bangkok 2007) for Makhampom Theatre, and Green Wolf (2007) for La Mama. Many of Xan's solo and collaborative stageplays have been produced including the acclaimed Hand-Holding series (Dancing With Strangers), the inter-artform colour interrogation Blue Views (City of Melbourne, 2006), and the short play Plum, (winner, 2003 Glen Eira Literary Awards national Short Stage Play Award). Recent honours include: Australian Postgraduate Award (2010-14, for PhD study, RMIT, Creative Media), International Artist Residency (Fundacion Valparaíso, Spain), Asialink Performing Arts Residency (2007, Makhampom Theatre, Thailand), and Ian Potter Cultural Trust Grant (2007, CCD capacity-building projects in South East Asia).

Gert Reifarth has worked as a lecturer in German and Cultural Studies in Germany, Ireland and at the University of Melbourne in Australia. He has written and published extensively about German literature, poetry and theatre practice. His direction credits include the Goethe/Amalia opera Erwin & Elmire (iOpera 2008), Brecht's Der Jasager und der Neinsager (NUI Galway/UCD Dublin 1998), Friedrich Dürrenmatt's Romulus der Groβe (NUI Galway & European Tour 1996), Peter Hacks' Noch einen Löffel Gift, Liebling? (NUI Galway 1995), and his own radio-playlive-on-stage: Who's Afraid of Harry Heine? (Open Stage 2008).

Christopher Mildren has worked in the Melbourne music scene for 15 years, covering rock, metal, punk, jazz, pop, comedy and theatrical productions. A prolific composer and multi-instrumentalist in all genres, Christopher here relishes the opportunity to fuse two of his greatest loves, classic-era punk and the stage musical.

Dayna Morrissey completed a Postgraduate Diploma in theatre design at the VCA in 2007. Whilst studying her design credits include *Smashed* by Lally Katz directed by Adena Jacobs, and Union House Theatre's production of *White with Wire Wheels* directed by Susie Dee, which received a Greenroom nomination for set design. Amongst various independent productions, Dayna has designed for Red Stitch, St Martins Youth Arts Centre, La Mama, Monash University Honors Ensemble, SPARC and Platform Youth Theatre.

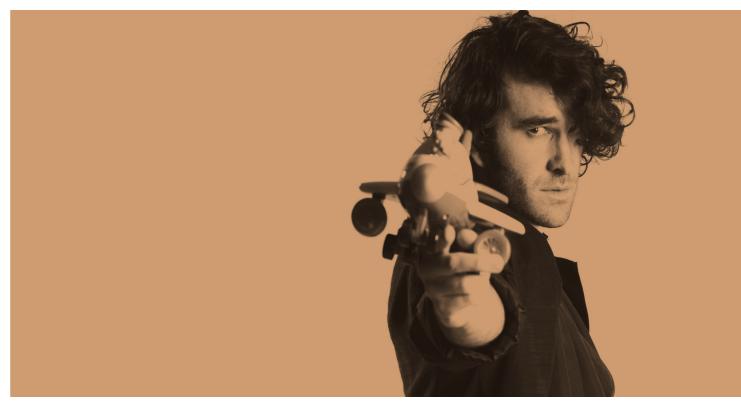
