I am on an empty set, held up by sound, beads of sweat and the roar of my life before. I am a gladiator. I live from the carrions of my own invention. I'm a warrior of beauty, a survivor, something of steel. I have strength, determination, power in failure and honour and grace in defeat.

Gabrielle Nankivell, Text, Physical Content and Performance

As an avid maker, performer, educator and collaborator, Gabrielle Nankivell's goal is to ignite the imagination of audiences and create continuing avenues of dialogue on the topic of performance. As a producer, director and co-director, her work has been presented in ten countries across three continents. As a creator and performer, she has been working worldwide since 2000 with companies and artists including Ultima Vez/Wim Vandekeybus (Belgium), Alexander Baervoets (Belgium), Aaben Dans/ Thomas Eisenhardt (Denmark), Thomas Steyaert (Belgium), Raul Maia (Portugal), Pierre Wyss (Germany), Australian Dance Theatre/Garry Stewart, Splintergroup, Animal Farm Collective, Luke Smiles, Gavin Webber and Regurgitator amongst others. She was also co-founder/ director of the Europe-based dance theatre company OX with Jurij Konjar from 2003-07.

Gabrielle Nankivell completed formal training with Jacqueline Tucker in Adelaide, holds a Bachelor of Dance from the Victorian College of the Arts, completed a Graduate Certificate in Arts (Writing) through Swinburne University, is currently undertaking her Masters Degree in Writing and is mentored daily by the world around her.

Luke Smiles

Original Soundtrack

The introduction of a Commodore 64 computer into the family home in the early 1980s began Luke Smiles's fascination with computers and sound. Having had no formal musical training but instead yielding to a keen interest in how things work, he has developed a unique practice in the development of soundtracks for dance and theatre. His appreciation of cinema has inspired a diverse sound-making practice and led him to work in areas including sound design, Foley work, sound effects editing and music composition. He is renowned for producing detailed soundtracks with a focus on the complete sound experience; a pursuit rarely followed in live theatre and a quality that sees his work in great demand both nationally and internationally.

Working under his business name motion laboratories, Luke Smiles has composed and produced soundtracks for artists and companies including Australian Dance Theatre, Bare Bones Dance Company (UK), Chunky Move, Dancenorth, Gabrielle Nankivell, Nederlands Dans Theater, OX Co. (Belgium/Slovenia), Rambert Dance Company (UK), Splinter group, Stompin, Tasdance, West Australian Ballet, and Windmill Theatre Company.





Benjamin Cisterne Design

Benjamin Cisterne is renowned for creating bold designs, based in light, that are integral to a performance. He is passionate about the capability of light in performance design, and its role in art; and works collaboratively on projects across all art forms. Since completing his studies in 2002 at the WA Academy of Performing Arts he has been involved in the creation of lighting designs for exhibitions at the Australian War Memorial and the National Sports Museum; for architecture, including the Darwin Entertainment Centre; and for performance projects including Tim Harbour's Halcyon for The Australian Ballet, Stephanie Lake's Mix Tape, and Gideon Obarzanek's Connected for Chunky Move. He has toured extensively as both designer and master electrician and completed artistic and technical residencies in Australia and Europe. He has worked with choreographers including Gavin Webber (Dancenorth/ independent), Phillip Adams (BalletLab), Luke George and Gabrielle Nankivell. His work has been recognised by the Green Room Awards on multiple occasions.

ARTS HOUSE
