Dance Massive, that meteoric explosion of Australia's most exciting, risk-taking dance artists, is the bright light in Melbourne's firmament for March, with nine **Dance Massive** shows at Arts House including seven world premieres. So from January all our spaces will be filled to bursting with artists testing and adjusting, editing and re-editing, in that glorious, sometimes terrifying rush of presenting a work for the first time. And while audiences look forward to the stellar line-up of makers whose work has been developed over many months and years, bubbling throughout **Dance Massive** will also be two new initiatives supporting the creation of great new works in the future: our **National Indigenous Choreographers Residency**, led by Jacob Boehme and Mariaa Randall; and **eXchange 2015**, bringing together three Australian and three Taiwanese dance-based artists.

In May, post's controversial **Oedipus Schmoedipus** kicks off a quartet of works that encourages deep listening, with a Melbourne premiere from Tamara Saulwick and a world premiere from Kate Neal – both works developed through Arts House's CultureLAB – and our pick of last year's Next Wave Festival, Matthias Schack-Arnott's **Fluvial**. Peppered throughout the season are Bek Berger's finely curated **Supper Clubs**, to enliven our conversations and our practice. And of course, our rich compost of development, CultureLAB, will be nourishing a host of artists cracking open new ideas and forms.

Thank you to both the artists and audiences for your passion and your curiosity, which make this all possible. Enjoy 2015!

Through acts of shameless abandon, Rawcus shares fantasies and vulnerabilities in a theatrical cabinet of curiosities. From karaoke to bedroom dancing and imagined celebrity, 12 performers grace eight stages, side-by-side in a tableau that becomes an exhibition of human expression.

With the audience empowered to watch all 'channels' at once, **Catalogue** is a triumph of composition, a portrait of a world where viewpoints and aesthetics are as diverse and complex as the bodies and personalities that make them. An imperfect catalogue of humanity, the work is an orchestration of private, public and performed selves.

Rawcus (*Small Odysseys, Another Lament, Hunger*) is an award-winning ensemble of artists with and without disabilities, who devise kaleidoscopic theatrical spectacles that quicken the heart and spark the mind.

Vicki Van Hout Long Grass

Presented by Arts House, Performance Space and Intimate Spectacle

Five people come out from the tall spear grass. He's feeling no-good sorry way, he says. She bin look after him, but really wants a holiday. He's runaway from payback, waiting for mob to forget. And she bin on the grog, always 'luring 'luring, causing trouble.

To live 'long grass' is to live on the fringe, yet right in the middle of the city – the Northern Territory term for Aboriginal people perceived as being homeless. Can honour, courage, solidarity and belonging exist outside a formal postcode and the trappings of stable housing?

Indigenous choreographer Vicki Van Hout's powerful new dance theatre work **Long Grass** combines weaving, shadowplay, text and sparse video with an idiosyncratic dance language indicative of the Top End; to find warmth, humour and play in a community at the edge.



Antony Hamilton & Alisdair Macindoe **MEETING**

Presented by Arts House, Antony Hamilton Projects and Insite Arts

MEETING reveals a fascination with the articulation of the body and mind in motion. A choreographic study stripped to the bare essentials, the work pairs Antony Hamilton's compulsive choreography with Alisdair Macindoe's obsessive machine-making practice.

The two performers share space with 64 robotic percussion instruments. A relentless stream of activity unfolds, where the bodies enter states of heightened physical and mental agency, with all actions carried by the meditative pulse of the machine beat.

A focused recital, with Hamilton's unique physical grammar and Macindoe's bespoke musical instrument making, **MEETING** composes the body, the space and the robots into a dynamic and riveting choreographic sound installation.

Lucy Guerin Inc Motion Picture

Presented by Arts House and Lucy Guerin Inc

Motion Picture takes the 1950 film noir classic *D.O.A.* as a choreographic score to explore the tensions between live performance and cinema.

The film opens with Frank Bigelow, a small-town everyman, reporting his own murder. He has been poisoned with a luminous toxin and with time running out, he is determined to find out why.

Caught between the living stage and the projected image, the audience is bathed in the flickering light of a screen mounted behind them. On stage, the dancers are both viewers and protagonists, using the cinematic elements as motivations for movement. The transference of information from one medium to another creates a physicalised abstraction of the moody aesthetic of film noir.

From the choreographer and director of *Conversation Piece* and *Weather* comes a surprising new work that both pays homage to the moving image and rebels against it.

Phillip Adams, Matthew Day, Luke George and Rennie McDougall each make a work, perform in all works and work together on one work: **Kingdom**.

Penetrating each other's artistic territories, hierarchies contested, and maps continually redrawn towards an encounter with otherness. Merge offers a poetic discourse on humans' co-existence with inanimate objects in our man-made universe. Created in collaboration with celebrated visual artists Bridie Lunney and Ash Keating, Lane's choreography collides and negotiates with Lunney's and Keating's uniquely designed objects in play, reflecting on our everyday ritualistic, material encounters.

Merge unearths the more unsettling nature of this relationship, questioning the modern-day understanding of material necessity. It acknowledges the beauty, absurdity and humour inherently present in this realm, and looks at the visual and aesthetic manifestation that is constructed and de-constructed in space.

Featuring sound design from renowned UK electronic musician Clark (Warp), **Merge** is a collision of bodies, sound and material, revealing the madness of humans' incessant compulsion to accelerate and adapt with their environment beyond what natural limits impose.

Stampede the Stampede expands choreography beyond the performer's lone presence, to include machinery, objects, lighting and sound configurations that affect and are affected by Darbyshire's moving, sounding body. Suspended within this system, the body delves into turbulent and controlled dynamics of thrashing, eruption, struggle and crumbling stillness.

Indigenous Choreographers Residencies

Arts House is excited to present two new initiatives as part of Dance Massive – the National Indigenous Choreographers Residency and the Local Indigenous Choreographers Residency.

Following an Expression of Interest process, choreographers Eric Avery, Ian RT Colless and Pauline Lampton have been selected to participate in the **National Indigenous Choreographers Residency**. These artists will work with an exciting group of industry leaders in an intensive and immersive residency from 8 to 17 March, at Arts House.

The **Local Indigenous Choreographers Residency** aims to address inherent issues around the retention of local contemporary Indigenous choreographers in Victoria, by enabling artists to work together in an intensive residency. Participating artists include Nikki Ashby, Sermsah Bin Saad, Ngioka Bunda-Heath, Baden Hitchcock and Carly Sheppard.

In both residency projects the participants will explore and exchange choreographic language, technique, inspirations and skills. The residencies also include a bespoke program of events including studio showings, attendance at Dance Massive performances, an international market session, and networking opportunities with national and international delegations.

Leading the **National and Local Indigenous Choreographers Residencies** are Jacob Boehme and Mariaa Randall. Facilitators include Gideon Obarzanek (choreographer), Helen Herbertson (choreographer and VCA Lecturer), Deon Hastie (Artistic Director, Kurruru) and Isaac Drandic (Associate Director, ILBIJERRI Theatre Company).

Post Oedipus Schmoedipus

Presented by Arts House, Belvoir and post

A great big festival of shuffling-off-the-mortal-coil, from a bunch of Australia's silliest/smartest theatre makers: post. **Oedipus Schmoedipus** takes several hundred of the all-time greatest plays, picks out the death scenes, mixes them together and hands them back to the people. Cunningly and cleverly carried off (no pun intended), it's a theatrical extravaganza two-and-a-half-thousand years in the making. For this mammoth undertaking, post are joined by 25 volunteers, a new cast rehearsed fresh each night.

From gore to laments to requiems to war cries, post sifted through the Great Truths of the Classics to pull out the juiciest stuff and find the true universal. Fed up with white men staging the deaths of white men in plays written by white men, the white ladies of post have pirated the theatrical canon in order to confront the great unknown. This is not 'Shakespeare in an Hour'. Death belongs to everyone.

post's work is joyful and dark, stupid and smart, down-home and over the top. **Oedipus Schmoedipus** is their bid for theatre history – either to join it, or wreck it.

Matthias Schack-Arnott **Fluvial**

Presented by Arts House and Speak Percussion

Emerging young Melbourne-based musician Matthias Schack-Arnott performs **Fluvial**, a solo work for a large-scale kinetic percussion instrument. A horizon of quivering metals, glass and stone are used to create a work of shimmering textural extremes.

Fluvial draws its inspiration from tidal movement, currents, transformation and ritual. Informed by Matthias' training as a classical percussionist, the work combines rigorous musical processes with an immersive installation environment. Objects are suspended *en masse* above an eight-metre bed of granite, metal and water. Glass bottles quiver and collide; overlapping metal tubes create glistening harmonic swells as wind chimes hover and sway over the instrument.

A stunning and beautifully balanced exploration of sound and texture, **Fluvial** renders the percussion instrument into a teeming, fluid mass, moving between the ecstatic and the absurd.

Tamara Saulwick **Endings**

Presented by Arts House, Tamara Saulwick and Insite Arts

Acclaimed performance maker Tamara Saulwick employs portable turntables, reel-to-reel tape players and live performance in a moving meditation on cycles and the ending of things. Featuring the voice of Paddy Mann (Grand Salvo), an electro-acoustic score by Peter Knight, and design by Ben Cobham, **Endings** explores the experiences – both ordinary and extraordinary – that cluster around death, dying and afterlife.

Endings is built, in part, from one-on-one interviews: real people's stories, reflections and voices. Cut onto bespoke vinyl records, these voices are embedded in a richly textured sound design; operated, accompanied and extended through live performance and song.

Voices of the living emerge from the crackle of records turning, vintage reel-to-reels send tape loops around the space. Performers converse with recorded thoughts from the past...and a voice floats through this evocative sound-world, singing an ode to the recently departed...



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


