The company's works emphasise relationships: between the 'being-present' of the audience, the specifics of place, and the work itself; reflecting an interest in engaging audience members actively in the creation of the work.

Chicago Shakespeare Theater

Chicago Shakespeare Theater (CST) is known for its extraordinary productions, unlocking Shakespeare's work for educators and students and serving as Chicago's cultural ambassador through its World's Stage Series. Led by Artistic Director Barbara Gaines and Executive Director Criss Henderson, CST is a recipient of the Regional Theatre Tony Award. Its work has been recognised internationally with three prestigious Laurence Olivier Awards (UK), and by Chicago's theatre community with over 75 Joseph Jefferson Awards for Artistic Excellence. Since the inception of the World's Stage Series in 2000, CST has hosted companies and festivals including The Abbey Theatre (Dublin), Shakespeare's Globe Theatre (London), the Chekhov International Theatre Festival (Moscow) and La Comédie-Française (Paris); presenting works ranging from intimate one-person pieces such as Omphile Molusi's Itsoseng (South Africa) to grand spectacles such as French troupe llotopie's Water Fools (Fous de Bassin), performed

on Lake Michigan. The company has toured some of its best works abroad, including its Olivier Award-winning production of Stephen Sondheim's *Pacific Overtures* (2003); *Henry IV, Parts 1 and 2 –* which marked CST's debut at the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratford-upon-Avon (2006); and *Othello: The Remix* (2012), which debuted at Shakespeare's Globe Theatre in London.

Richard Jordan Productions

Based in London, Richard Jordan Productions enjoys relationships with many of the world's leading artists, writers, theatres and producing organisations. The company has produced over 180 productions in 19 countries, including 71 world premieres and 88 European, Australian or USA premieres. Australian productions include Belgian company Ontroerend Goed's Teenage Riot, All that is Wrong, The Smile Off Your Face, Once and For All We're Gonna Tell You Who We are so Shut Up and Listen, A History of Everything, Internal, A Game of You and Fight Night; Believe; one step at a time like this's en route; Heroin(e) for Breakfast; Funk it Up About Nothin'; Bigger than Jesus; My Filthy Hunt; Berkoff's Women; Othello: the Remix; Itsoseng; BigMouth; Die Roten Punkte - Robot/Lion tour; MacHomer: The Simpsons Do Macbeth; Basic Training; Bitch Boxer; Dickens' Women and the Traverse Theatre Edinburgh production of Midsummer (a play with songs). Richard's past productions have won a variety of awards including the Laurence Olivier award and the 2013 Tony Award for Best New Play; Drama Desk, Drama League, New York Critics, broadway.com, Outer Critics Circle, Lucille Lortel and John Gassner Best New Play Awards; Scotsman Fringe First, Herald Angel, Total Theatre and Helen Hayes Awards; and the US Black Alliance Award. Richard Jordan was first recipient of the TMA/Society of London Theatre Producers Award and has been named seven times among the UK Stage Top 100 British Theatre Professionals.

Melbourne Festival

Melbourne Festival is one of Australia's leading arts festivals, presenting unique Australian and international dance, theatre, music, visual arts, multimedia, and free and outdoor events, over 17 days each October. First staged in 1986 under the direction of composer Gian Carlo Menotti, it became the third in the Spoleto Festival series – joining Spoleto, Italy, and Charleston, USA. Known as Spoleto Melbourne – Festival of the Three Worlds, it changed its name to Melbourne International Festival in 1990. In 2003, the Festival was renamed Melbourne International Arts Festival, and is now commonly known as Melbourne Festival.
