Dissent contains haze, occasional loud sounds, and invited audience participation.

Access Services

Pre-Show Access Session

All shows include a 15-minute drop-in session 1 hour prior to start time for anyone who would benefit from being in the performance space beforehand, to learn more about the work and meet the performer in a relaxed setting.

Relaxed space

These are not relaxed performances in the usual sense, but audience members are welcome to come and go as they please, be themselves, make noise, stim, and respond to the work for the duration.

Visual descriptions will be integrated into performances.



Assistance Animal are welcome.



Aural Rating 50% - this performance has both sound and visual components, but sight is not essential to be able to engage with the event.



This performance is fully wheelchair accessible.

Performers

There is 1 performer in this show – Daley Rangi.

Daley has a beard and short hair, both brown in colour. They hold a neon purple twenty-sided die in their left hand, their elbow resting on the table. On the table is a wooden box, with an assortment of dice and game pieces piled in front of it. There are also four audience participants in this show who are selected at the start of each performance.

Audience Experience

Dissent involves role-play and invites four players, and the audience, to make choices and respond to provocations.

On entry, an Arts House front of house staff member will greet you and offer you a green, red or yellow sticker. These stickers are a visual tool to indicate how much you want to participate in the performance.

Green indicates you're interested in being invited to play and be asked questions as an audience member.

Yellow indicates you do not want to play, but you're happy to be asked questions as an audience member. It is okay to pass on the questions in the moment.

Red indicates you prefer to watch and do not want to play or be asked questions.

If you choose to play you will be asked questions, respond to choices and encouraged to verbally or non-verbally interact with the performer.

The performer, Daley Rangi, will guide players and the audience through the performance.

The performer will offer tea to the players.

There will be a lot of eye contact from the performer towards the players, and sometimes towards the audience. You do not have to make eye contact with the performer.

Every 25 minutes there will be a 5-minute break.

Social expectations

Audience will have multiple seating options including:

- Standard seat with back in close proximity to playing space
- High bar stool with back with bar table behind standard seats
- Cushioned chairs and floor seating is available further away from the playing space for those who like to listen but not watch

The four players will have standard seats with backs, evenly spaced around a round table. The performer, Daley, does not sit at the playing table and will be walking around the space.

Audience can leave and re-enter the space throughout the performance.

Audiences are welcome to physically stim and be themselves, however the work is primarily told through spoken interactions with the participants, and loud noises may distract other audience members from the performance.

Performance expectations

The performer will be wearing a purple ski mask. There is a session one hour before each show where you can meet the performer without them wearing the mask and explore the space. The performer will also remove the mask at the end of the show.

Entry to space

On arrival the audience will be directed to the Supper Room, located at the basement level, via either the stairs or the lift.

Shocks or surprises

The table is lit by a single overhead lamp. The lamp will move seemingly by itself two times during the show and will be accompanied by a rumbling sound.

The table will vibrate noticeably when this happens, and it is likely it will scatter the playing pieces.

Sensory Elements

Sound

The work takes place mainly through spoken interactions between the performer and four participants. Quiet low frequency atmospheric sound plays throughout the work.

There are four speakers spread through the space. The performer will speak loudly and may have a headset microphone to support this, and the participants and audience will be encouraged to speak as loud as possible if they are engaging with the performer.

Lighting

The space is lit dimly with red, blue, and purple lights. There is a hanging bulb over the main playing table. The lights do not change at any point and the space does not go dark.

Physical

The performer will not touch players or audience during the show. Audience members and players sit in close proximity to one another.

Smell

The room may smell musty.

Visual

The space has been designed to look like a messy storage room.

There are tables on their side tucked up against one end of the room, and stacks of chairs all around the space. Some of the chair stacks are higher than others, but won't fall over during the performance.

There is a round white table in the middle of the room, with a map marked out on it using different kinds of tape in red, blue and purple. Some of the sections of tape are raised off the table higher than others.

There are colourful and differently shaped tokens placed purposefully across the map, indicating characters, buildings, trees and modes of transport.

The seating is arranged around the playing table in a diamond formation, with up to three rows of chairs, as well as five tall round bar tables with tall stools.

There is a bar in the space, and the wall behind is lit with purple lights along its whole length.

Daley will be wearing a bright purple balaclava for the duration of the performance, and a grey t-shirt with green cartoon image of two dice holding hands with the caption "All Cubes Are Beautiful".

Other

Content Warnings

Dissent involves role-play and invites four players, and the audience, to make choices and respond to provocations. These provocations encourage facilitated, but improvised and sometimes unplanned, exploration of hyperlocal social, political, or economic class systems and dynamics, and may imagine situations which involve acts of authoritarianism, aggression, coarse language, and other forms of violence.

There is a chance that the players/participants may offer up content or language that could be discomforting or triggering to some audience members – the performer will actively engage in defusing or reorienting such content where necessary for audience safety.

Please feel free to openly communicate to the performer or front of house team if you find yourself in distress.

Audience members are welcome to exit and return to the room at any time.

General Notes

The performer will Acknowledge Country in their storytelling at the beginning and end of the performance.

An announcement will be made to remind the audience of the Artist Talk on Thursday March 21. The Artist Talk will run for approximately 30 minutes post-show and it is optional for audience to stay.



Box Office




Box Office is located in the foyer under the stairwell.




Image: Quiet space with lights dimmed

All bathrooms have Dyson hand dryers with sensor activation. There is an accessible bathroom that is single use on ground level opposite the Quiet Space. There is another accessible bathroom upstairs – this is accessible via lift or stairs.

An artist statement is available on signage and warnings on the door.




Image: Entry to Supper Room via stairs or lift located behind reception.

Parking

There is limited paid on-street parking on Queensberry Street and Errol Street.

There are two accessible on street car parking spaces on Queensberry Street (150m to our accessible Errol Street entrance) for holders of a Parking Permit for Disabled people.

COVID Safety
